Minutes of the regular meeting of the Council of the City of Monongahela, due notice of which meeting was published according to law, held Wednesday October 11, 2017 at 7 P.M. in Council Chambers. The meeting was called to order by Councilman Caudill who led in the pledge to the flag.

Public Forum:

George Eckert, President of MARC, thanked the Mayor, City Council and the Monongahela Police Department for their help with the 5K race on September 30 and also Al Viliky at the official starter. There were 112 runners with 92 from Monongahela.

Tim Parsons, 1123 Fourth Street, passed out copies of an affidavit that a police officer filed which he said was wrong and the Chief won't do anything about it. Chief Tempest said he would not take any action because of pending litigation. Solicitor Pappasergi and he would review the affidavit and advised Mr. Parsons to be present at the next work session of city city to get a response.

Terry Necciai, 400 Meade Street, informed council of an ongoing contest with the flower planters and said that greens will replace the flower in the planters for the holiday season. Pumpkins will be hung for the halloween parade. He thanked the city for having the lamp posts painted and offered to help paint the parking meters.

Chad DeSantis, Lawton Street, said he was concerned about the speeding and traffic on the Avenues and suggested adding more stop signs and installing speed bumps. Chief Tempest said a traffic study would be required to add a stop sign but stop signs or speed bumps are not permitted to just slow down traffic. Councilman Kulak said that both E. Washington and Peters Township have speed bumps so Chief Tempest said he would research that.

Ryan Feld, President of Ringgold Youth Athletic Association, asked permission to improve the Mounds Fields by adding dirt, a fence and replacing the dugouts. Councilman Miller said it was no problem as long as the city received their insurance information but asked the Solicitor if the work would interfere with the street department contract by allowing others to make improvements to the fields. The Solicitor said he would check with the city's collective bargaining agreement. Mr. Feld said if these improvements could be made, then baseball tournaments could be held at the Mounds.

Anthony Necciai, East Main Street, wanted to know who said the person wasn't going to continue putting the military banners together because he had no help. He said he inquired and the person never said this. He also said he was told the money was received to tear down the property on East Main Street. He was told that no money actually comes to the city but is controlled by the Washington County Redevelopment Authority.

Jim Braum, Park Avenue, said he was concerned about the kids on bicycles riding in and out of traffic and on sidewalks. Chief Tempest said he hoped that once school started this would slow down but it hasn't. If they are caught by the police, their bicycles are confiscated and in order to retrieve them, they have to return with a parent to get them back.
